We are all called to do our part and I believe that is what Paul is talking about when he says, "... whether I come and see you or am absent and hear about you, ...".

Week after week, month after month, our leaders ask that we make announcements for assistance and needs and many of them are filled when it comes to one-time events, but the needs for continuing parts of our ministry programs do not always get filled. What is Ordinary Time?

Pentecost comes from the Greek word that means "fiftieth." This 50th day after Easter celebrates the "birthday" of the church with the gift of the Holy Spirit poured out on God's people gathered together. On that day, as told in Acts 2, there was a strong wind and what appeared as flames of fire that rested on each of them as the Holy Spirit filled the people and enabled them to communicate with others they normally would not be able to speak to because they grew up speaking different languages. It is an extraordinary event and a celebration of the church that reminds us how powerful the Holy Spirit is to accomplish God's mission through us in ways that are beyond what we can often imagine. This birthday of the church relates to baptism as the time we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit marking our new birth in faith belonging to God's family and shining the light of Christ in the world.

Following Pentecost is Holy Trinity Sunday, recognizing our awareness of God in the unity and personhood of God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. After these significant celebrations of the church we start marking the days as to how many days have passed after Pentecost until Christ the King Sunday which is the last day of the church year before a new year begins with Advent, the end of November or the beginning of December. So, this largest portion of time in the Christian liturgical calendar that follows Pentecost is sometimes called "ordinary time" because there are not many festivals or celebrations during those 25 weeks. The liturgical color is green like this stole from my home congregation. The Gospel readings often recount Jesus' ministry like miraculously feeding the crowds, healing the sick, calming the storms, and teaching with parables. These seem anything but ordinary to me.



This year I think we are all looking forward to something "ordinary" which, for us, likely means a time of travel and getting together with family and friends. We are figuring out if it is ok to hug, shake hands, and spend time together indoors again without wearing masks. We are looking forward to less stress and breathing easy, hopefully having made it through a pandemic. Of course, it is still too early to claim everything is back to normal or even that a new normal has been reached, but much progress has been made to decrease the spread of COVID-19 here. We still see some cases of illness in our area and certainly some countries across the world are overwhelmed in trying to care for the sick.

In these times, we hold on to our faith and daily look to God to feed us with hope through the Bible and stories of Jesus carrying out God's ministry to feed, heal, forgive, and save us. This summer may we join in the "ordinary" work of Jesus as we enjoy the gifts God has given us in this life and grow our compassion for the suffering of others that we might support the work that sustains life and healthy communities here and across the globe.

COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

April 14th – 7:00pm

Jerome called the meeting to order.

Present-Jerome Crandall, Todd Erickson, Monica Haugen, Pastor Walka, Melissa Grommesh, Pastor Jacobson, Stacy Link, Derek Flanagan, Josiah Crandall.

Opening Devotions led by Pastor Jacobson.

Secretary Report-Minutes from March 10, 2021 were discussed. Todd made a motion, Stacy seconded, to accept the minutes.

Financial Report-Pastor Mike went through the Financials in Broc's absence. He went through the Rev/Exp report. He also talked about some new reports that were created to show the council where the Office Manager gets the dollar amount that is applied to the Principal payment at the end of the month. Fund Summary by Date was the chosen report. Melissa made a motion, Stacy seconded, to approve the financials. The April bills were presented Todd made a motion, Derek seconded, to approve the bills. Motion passed.

Committee Reports

Worship/Media-Derek said finding ushers is proving to be a challenge. He is contacting people by email and text right now and is wondering if we should try different forms of communication. He is going to set up a sign-up genius and send it to Pastor Mike to be emailed to the Congregation.

Education-Stacy said there are 2 weeks of Sunday School left. She said last week was awesome with a great turnout. She has gotten several volunteers without asking for VBS. She has another meeting planned for VBS planning.

Property-Todd said the grounds got seeded a week ago. We got rain and snow after the seeding, so he is hopeful for good growth. There was a meeting last night with Sheyenne Garden to help with planning.

Social Outreach and Ministry-Monica is hoping to meet with Wendy Mensing to begin planning for the Summerfest lunch.

Fellowship and Support Committee-Melissa has met with the Funeral group to create a menu page for families to choose from for morning and afternoon funerals.

Old Business

Building project Update:

Stained Glass Window Warranty-Jerome talked about the stained-glass window in the balcony having a couple squares in the wrong place. Terry will be coming and fixing that.

Carpet and Tile Warranty-The tile guys will be coming to work on the sacristy floor and the family bathroom.

JDP Electric Bid-The conversation started about the 2 lights above the chancel area and to look at the idea of extra lights along the sides because it is dark. Grotberg said they have too many big jobs to come back to give us a quote. JDP gave a bid of \$7,790.00. Broc brought up the question of whether we want to spend the money. Pastor Mike gave examples of where money could come from. Ex: Building Fund, Memorial Funds, and some of the Council Money. Todd made a motion to go forward with the scope of the bid using Building Funds. Broc seconded. Stacy wants to go over the funding options for clarification. Motion passed.

Garage Proposals-The proposals range from the largest 24'x24'-\$19,000 to a single car size option-\$8,000 from the school. The color options come from the Menards sample sheet and the colors could match the church. The students would like to get the concrete poured this year so the current students could help. In the

fall two other classes would do the building itself. Broc made a motion to proceed with building a 24'x24' garage with the condition of having the funding in place, Todd seconded. Motion passed.

Food Serving Policy/Guidelines-If we go to masks recommended then Melissa thinks we should return to serving food at the same time.

Mask Policy-Melissa suggested May 3rd might be a good time to go to recommended masks because Sunday School will be done and gets us past Confirmation. All residents in ND have had an opportunity to get vaccinated. Pastor Mike cited examples of what some other area churches are doing. He feels that as a council and congregation we have done really well. If May 3rd is the date, it would give people time to get vaccinated and to give proper notice to the congregation of the change, to attend church with or without a mask. Broc thinks if we are letting people not wear masks at Coffee time then we should lift the mask mandate, if we keep the mandate then Coffee hour should be stopped. Melissa doesn't want to stop coffee hour. Broc made a motion for April 18th mask recommended. Motion fails for lack of second. Todd made a motion to go mask recommended May 1st. Melissa seconded. Broc pointed out that the motion is covering keeping coffee hour which we are already doing. Pastor Mike said that he would like to give a specific reason why we are moving from required to recommended. Derek gave examples of the vaccination availability and Sunday School is over by May 1st. Todd is withdrawing his motion. Todd's new motion is to go recommended mask and allow serving of food as of May 1st, Melissa seconded. Motion passed, Broc abstained.

Interior Design-Stacy said the crew met last week, and some items have been ordered to complete certain areas. The art project may exceed Lynn Madsen's memorial funds, so the Design team agreed to cover the overage from their budget if there is any.

New Business

Potential Eagle Scout Project – Josiah Crandall presented an idea for his Eagle Scout project. He would like to have a Prayer Garden; space to honor babies that have died. All of the Council members were excited by his drawings and concept. They asked him to meet with the Landscaping planners to work on his idea.

Summer Worship Time-Pastor Mike said he has received requests to move Sunday worship to evenings during the summer. From the feedback from music, altar guild and ushering only one negative comment was received. First Sunday of June to last Sunday of August is the suggestion. Melissa and Derek feel this would be a good idea to try. Todd and Broc agree. Broc moves that Sunday worship is held at 7pm June 1st to Aug. 31st Derek seconded. Motion passed.

Radio Broadcasted Worship Service-The Truck quoted \$150 each Sunday to have it broadcast on the radio. There is really no way to capture listener numbers for radio. Council is fine with the online presence we have.

Replacing Hymnals back to the pews-The council is fine with the hymnals going back into the pews.

Lockbox for Fire Department-The 9 firefighters that are members are willing to split the cost of a lockbox for the firefighters to have access to the building in case of a fire. Todd made a motion to allow placement of the lockbox. Melissa seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Abolish Nursery Policy-Jerome doesn't think we would need to man the nursery now that there is glass and attached to the Sanctuary. Stacy made a motion to abolish the policy, Derek seconded, motion passed.

PTA Carnival-May 23rd there will be a PTA sponsored carnival and they are asking if anyone would like to run a booth/game? Monica thinks it would take minimal commitment and could be done.

City complaint-There is a complaint that the ditch needs to be put back in place. Todd says the ditches aren't done yet; they are not seeded. He will talk to Kevin Mayer.

Janitorial-The janitor staff has tendered their 2-week notice. Pastor Mike will announce the need for cleaning volunteers.

Pastor's Report and Remarks-Pastor Keith stated we are finishing up Sunday School-87 in attendance. The last Sunday there will be an acknowledgment of the Educators, Stations of the Cross and Butterfly went well. 11 members received First Communion; he has been catching up on sermon notes. Quilters have healthy kits and will have quilts ready for blessing in May. He has visited members with palms and attended the Ministerial meeting. VBS planning is ongoing, Sophie has a piano recital May 15th. He was on vacation and attended a virtual graveside service for his wife's grandma. Pre-marriage meetings are coming up. Music planning for the next few months is scheduled. He is signing up to be a Pastor of the week at Red Willow in July.

Pastor Mike has a baptism on Saturday. New Member Sunday will be May 16th, New Member Gathering will be May 12th, then council meeting. Men of Martins April 19th; By-laws committee have met to go over the examples of by-laws. Tanner, door guy, was here because the handicap door was not latching because of a stress fracture on the hinge. The coffee maker is having noise issues. Bunn recommends putting a filter on the water line and then they will help us recalibrate the machine. Pastor Mike gave last rights to Steve Ramsey, father to Gannon Ramsey. A bungee chair collapsed in the ACTS room. The drum seat has been squeaking so a replacement has been purchased. Semis are using our parking lot as a turn around. Home visits have been completed for the first time in a year. Pastor Mike will see if anyone will volunteer to sing on Traditional Sundays to help the Sound booth follow the music. The quote came for repairs for the insurance claim. The processing will begin. The deductible will be covered.


HOLY YOGA CLASSES

One director told me about the effect God's Wind has on things that grow. It seems that over time, trees that have to stand out in the open become shaped in the direction the wind is blowing. Unless there are other trees around to block it from happening, a tree will eventually be shaped by the force and direction of the wind. Then, as living proof, the funeral director began to point out to me tree after tree that had all been shaped in this way, trees that I confess I had passed by many times, but had never really seen until then. Once this was pointed out to me, I began to see them everywhere. The cemetery was literally filled with them! All shaped by the Winds of God!

I leave you with this question. Like those trees in the cemetery, do we, as individuals, and as a congregation, show any evidence of being shaped by the Winds of God's Spirit? Is the new beginning Pentecostal experience a fresh, yet continuing presence in our lives?
